USING IMAGES TO CREATE CULTURAL CONNECTIONS AND TO REPRESENT YOUR STUDENTS...

In our classrooms, the students represent a variety of cultures, of beliefs, & of experiences. The artwork we use can help students to learn more about other cultures (as well as their own) & to see themselves represented in their school world. The image selection is an integral component in successful VTS sessions. The criteria for image selection includes overlapping considerations as seen in the Venn diagram below.

In addition to the criteria below, you should also consider your overall outcome/purpose for the activity, cultures represented among your students, and the topics of interest for the class. Representing various ethnicities & cultures, you can open the doors to cultural connectedness, to social studies topics, and even to literature connections!
